AUTOMATED METER READING CONTINUES TO PROGRESS

The Automated Meter Reading (AMR) project that is currently being implemented by the City is progressing on schedule. Through six weeks of the project, a total of 1,552 meters have been replaced by the City's contractor, United Meters, Inc. (UMI) and an additional 682 radios have been installed by City crews for a total of 2,234 meters that are AMR compatible and reading back to the tower. A total of 5,500 meters are planned for replacement and thus the project is approximately one-third complete.

The city's system was originally divided into seven areas for manual meter reading and billing purposes as indicated by the first two digits of your account number. Meter replacement started in Area 1 and is progressing sequentially. The first scheduling request letters for Area 1 were mailed on April 16. Of the 1,465 meters in Area 1, only 47 meters (or 3.2%) remain for replacement.

As we progress into each Area, residents will receive an initial letter requesting an appointment be scheduled for work required inside. Follow up notices will also be sent every two weeks up to a total of three courtesy notices. It is our intent to accommodate individual schedules to insure full participation, and as such, after hour and Saturday appointments are available upon request.

Below is the tentative schedule for initial notices by Area:

Area 1	April 16	
Area 2	May 9	
Area 3	May 31	
Area 4	June 17	
Area 5	July 18	
Area 6	August 22	
Area 7	September 12	

As a reminder, the following schedule for the transition from quarterly to monthly billing is in effect:

<u>Usage</u>	Bill Date	Due Date
April, May, June	July 1	July 31
July and August	September 1	September 30
September	October 1	October 31

Based on this schedule, monthly billing will not be fully implemented until October for September usage and will continue on a monthly basis thereafter. This intentional, gradual transition has created some confusion, leading some to believe that we are already billing monthly, when in fact they have received a quarterly or bi-monthly bill. Please look at the actual read dates printed on your bill to confirm the time period covered. Once monthly billing comes online, all bills City-wide will be read on the same date.

For a family of three a typical monthly usage is 6,000 gallons. The water/sewer bill, including the technology fee, for a single meter household that uses 6,000 gallons is projected at \$80.05 per month. A bill for a dual meter household that uses 6,000 gallons is projected at \$81.70 per month.

Building and Code Enforcement FAQ's

Building a new home, opening a business, or subdividing property can be very nerve-wracking and cause great anxiety. However, the process can go quite

smoothly by consulting City staff. The City of Washington webpage (www.ci.washington.il.us) offers considerable information on everything needed to apply for a building permit or submitting a subdivision plat. The site includes downloadable permits, maps, and links to the Building, Subdivision, and Zoning Codes. If there are any questions, residents are urged to contact City Hall at 444-1122.

Building permits are required for any new structure or remodeling of an existing building that includes structural support work. Permits must also be obtained for the construction of garages, sheds, fences, permanent swimming pools, signs, and streetside driveway approaches. Permits are NOT required for non-structural support work, siding, swing sets, inflatable or temporary swimming pools, and non-streetside driveway approaches.

Spring and summer bring a heightened awareness to various code enforcement issues. Every property owner has the duty to maintain their property so as to not negatively impact the nearby property values. The following are different examples of nuisance violations as specified by City Code:

- Grass and weeds growing to a height of more than eight (8) inches;
- Abandoned or inoperative motor vehicles and equipment;
- ♦ Abandoned, discarded, or unused equipment such as automobiles or parts, furniture, stoves, refrigerators, or building materials such as lumber, windows, and piping;
- Unsanitary matter kept on the premises; and
- Connecting footing tiles or downspouts to the sanitary sewer system.

LAWN MOWING SEASON IS HERE!

Be reminded that grass clippings cannot be deposited into the street along your property. Disposal of grass clippings result in obstructed storm sewers, which can create a serious problem when it rains. If grass clippings are deposited into the street, we ask that you sweep them and either use as mulch or dispose of as you would your landscape waste. Your cooperation will help ensure that storm sewers in your area are working as they were designed to do. Thank you!

WASHINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT—Protecting Your Home Against Crime

- <u>Never allow strangers into your home</u> Use your peephole and don't open the door! Have a person who is stranded and claims to need help wait outside while you call for assistance. Call the Washington Police Department and we will assist the stranded person.
- <u>Play it smart on the telephone</u> Don't let callers know if you are home alone, or that your home is empty at certain times of the day. Retrieve answering machine messages often. Never give out credit card numbers or other personal information (unless you have initiated the call to a reputable organization).
- *Vary your routine* Changing your daily patterns (even slightly) may be enough to discourage a burglar.
- <u>Put away tools and machinery when not in use</u> Don't leave them lying around where they could be stolen or used to gain entry into your home.
- <u>Store ladders indoors</u> Don't provide burglars with a handy way to climb in through balconies, second-floor windows, etc.


