## CITY OFFERS MULTIPLE PAYMENT OPTIONS FOR WATER BILL

There are now multiple ways to pay your water bill as follows:



• Snail mail – we will always accept payments made through the mail – just make sure you leave plenty of time for the Post Office to deliver so we receive payment by the due date in order to avoid those pesky late fees!

• In person – we are also happy to accept your payment in person at City Hall located at 301 Walnut Street.

**Bank** – both Washington State Bank (1110 Peoria Street) and Ipava State Bank (116 Washington Square) will accept water payments.

- **Drop-off** we have a box located on the N. Elm Street side entrance that is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Anything in the box at 8:00 a.m. will be treated as received the day before.
- Electronic debit if you haven't already, consider signing up for automatic withdrawal from your checking or savings account. You will still receive a bill every month showing usage and amount due, but you never have to worry about being charged a late fee or possibly having service terminated for non-payment. You can request a form at City Hall, by calling (309) 444-8292, or you can download a form from our website at www.ci.washington.il.us/egov/documents/1484700349\_32977.pdf.
- Credit card as of May 1, 2017, the City is no longer using Epay for credit card payments and is instead
  accepting credit card payments made through our new website online payment center. VISA, Mastercard,
  American Express and Discover cards are accepted. The payment center can be accessed on our website at
  www.ci.washington.il.us.

If you have any questions about these payment options or would like to discuss your bill, please contact the Water Department at (309) 444-8292. Please keep in mind that bills are due each month on the last day of the month billed, late fees are applied if payment has not been received by the due date, and an account is subject to termination if payment has not been received by the 15<sup>th</sup> of the month following the month the bill was issued. A previous balance along with a late fee will be indicated on the next month's bill if the payment was not received by the due date.

## **BE AWARE OF SUMMERTIME HEAT RELATED ILLNESS!**


Our Fire Department shares the following information: Your body normally cools itself by sweating. During hot weather, especially with high humidity, sweating just isn't enough. Your body temperature can rise to dangerous



levels and you can develop a heat illness. Most heat illnesses occur from staying out in the heat too long, but they can also occur indoors from an underlying illness or lack of hydration. Certain medications can cause you to easily become dehydrated as well. Sometimes consuming water may not be enough and the electrolyte Sodium, found in Gatorade-type beverages, is also needed. Call 911 if any signs and symptoms of a heat

related illness are observed. These include: fainting; light-headedness; fast heart rate; red/dry pale skin; headache, body cramps; and severe thirst. *Have a safe and happy summer!* 

## NEW PUBLIC MAPPING AVAILABLE SOON!



City staff has used products through our Geographic Information Systems (GIS) vendor ESRI called ArcMap and ArcReader for many years for its mapping needs. GIS offers an array of map and data options that provide considerable assistance to our residents and businesses. ESRI has been slowly phasing out the ArcReader platform as cities have looked for more dynamic ways to bring this data to the public. Staff have recently been migrating from ArcReader to ArcGIS Online for many of our internal mapping needs. And we're now ready to offer the public the benefits of this product!

We plan on launching this through the City's website <u>www.ci.washington.il.us</u> on July 3. ArcGIS Online will offer many layers, including zoning, school districts, buildings, floodplains, parks, and school districts. Available attribute data includes acreage, short legal description, and assessed value. Aerial imagery from 2015 is also accessible as part of the mapping.

#### **Building and Code Enforcement FAQ's**

Building a new home, opening a business, or subdividing property can be very nerve-wracking and cause great anxiety. However, the process can go quite

smoothly by consulting City staff. The City of Washington webpage www.ci.washington.il.us offers considerable information on everything needed to apply for a building permit or submitting a subdivision plat. The site includes downloadable permits, maps, and links to the Building, Subdivision, and Zoning Codes. If there are any questions, residents are urged to contact City Hall at 444-1122.

Building permits are required for any new structure or remodeling of an existing building that includes structural support work. Permits must also be obtained for the construction of garages, sheds, fences, permanent swimming pools, signs, and streetside driveway approaches. Permits are NOT required for non-structural support work, siding, swing sets, inflatable or temporary swimming pools, and non-streetside driveway approaches.

Spring and summer bring a heightened awareness to various code enforcement issues. Every property owner has the duty to maintain their property so as to not negatively impact the nearby property values. The following are different examples of nuisance violations as specified by City Code:

- Grass and weeds growing to a height of more than eight (8) inches;
- Abandoned or inoperative motor vehicles and equipment; ٠
- Abandoned, discarded, or unused equipment such as automobiles or parts, furniture, stoves, refrigerators, or building materials such as lumber, windows, and piping;
- Unsanitary matter kept on the premises; and
- Connecting footing tiles or downspouts to the sanitary sewer system.

## CITY LAUNCHES NEW RESIDENT-FOCUSED WEBSITE!

The City of Washington launched a new website this spring focused on improving city services for



residents. "We are excited to release our new website and I want to encourage folks to look at how much it has been improved," stated Mayor Gary Manier.

The website offers four new tools that modernize the delivery of city services.

- Resident Request Center allows residents to report concerns 24/7 online.
- Payment Center accepts credit card payments 24/7 online and at City Hall. ٠
- Utility Bill Lookup allows you to view the balance due on your utility bill.
- E-Notify is an email & text news subscription tool to help residents stay informed.

The new site is also mobile friendly and designed to allow residents to take advantage of all four self-service tools from a smart phone, tablet, or desktop computer. "We've made it easier for residents to request a service, pay their utility bill and stay informed," explained Jim Culotta, City Administrator.

Another reason for redesigning the website was to represent the community well to others outside the city by illustrating Washington's high quality of life. The homepage now features aerial video taken last summer, including the historic Washington Square, Five Points, parks, schools, and other areas. We hope you take advantage of all that it offers!

## LAWN MOWING SEASON IS HERE!

Be reminded that grass clippings cannot be deposited into the street along your property. Disposal of grass



clippings result in obstructed storm sewers, which can create a serious problem when it rains. If grass clippings are deposited into the street, we ask that you sweep them and either use as mulch or dispose of as you would your landscape waste. Your cooperation will help ensure that storm sewers in your area are working as they were designed to do. Thank you!

## WASHINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT—Vehicle Burglaries

Nice summer weather makes it easier for people to get outside, but not all of our neighbors have our best interests



in mind. Summer brings increased opportunities for thieves to benefit at our expense through vehicle and other burglaries. Washington and surrounding areas have seen a seasonal uptick in burglary reports involving vehicles. You can help cut down on your risk and benefits to thieves by removing valuable items, including keys, cash and change, from your car and locking it. Of several recent Washington and Washington-area car burglaries, only two involved forced entry to the cars. In both

of those cases, a potentially valuable item such as a purse or wallet was in plain view. Burglaries to locked cars are rare and almost never occur when the thief does not know for certain a desired item is present. Another note relates to concealed weapons permit holders: always remove firearms from your vehicle and store them in a truly secure location. These steps can reduce the likelihood of you taking a day to replace driver's licenses, credit cards, or other valuables you earned (and that other guy didn't). Thanks!
